Board member K Galloway submitted the following questions for response as per Standing Orders sections 20.4, 20.5 and 20.6.

Town Centre Feature Lighting

Question:

After it was agreed that Council would proceed with Coloured Festoons and 'Fairy' Lights' was a consultant engaged to advise on the lights to be purchased? If not why not?

Response.

The Lighting Designer who carried out the peer review provided staff with a recommended fairy light supplier. Advice received was that this was a reputable supplier who has supplied and installed lights in many locations including the Viaduct Basin in Auckland. The recommendation to use this supplier was followed.

Question:

After it was agreed that Council would proceed with Coloured Festoons and 'Fairy' Lights' were various Festoon Lights and 'Fairy' lights considered? If not Why not?

Response:

The festoon lights were sourced from the same supplier that provided the lights for the eastern end of High Street. These lights have functioned well and we have had no issues with the lights themselves. By staying with the same supplier we were able to ensure that the festoon lights matched the existing festoons and did not look different. These lights are also able to be connected directly to the street light circuit and do not require larger transformer boxes on the street light poles to convert the supply to a lower current. When the original festoon lights were sourced, Mainpower carried out a significant amount of research to ensure the lights were suitable and met required criteria.

As outlined above, the Fairy Lights were recommended by the Lighting Designer who carried out the peer review. A trial was carried out with the Board on the 4th October 2018. At the trial it was agreed that the fairy lights provided the desired effect and the instruction was given to go ahead with the lights. The lights trialled are exactly the same as those which have been installed.

Question:

After it was agreed that Council would proceed with Coloured Festoons and 'Fairy' Lights' was a design Consultant engaged to plan the layout of the 'Fairy' lights in the trees? If not why not?

Response:

The recommendation to light clusters of trees at the build outs was provided by the peer reviewer and it was recommended that the fairy light supplier was very experienced in lighting trees and was the appropriate person to provide guidance on how the trees should be lit. The fairy lighting supplier recommended that the fairy lights in the trees be installed in an "Umbrella" style as it would provide the best visual effect. As these trees are covered in leaves for a large portion of the year, lights up higher on branches would not be visible when the tree is in leaf. This was discussed at the fairy light trial.

The advantage of this fairy light system is that more strings can easily be added to the existing installation in the future if this was desired.

Question:

If no consultant/s was/were engaged, how were the decisions made regarding the 3 questions above.

Response:

This has been answered above.

Question:

Will Council be undertaking a review of this lighting project, especially given that some lights were not operational, and in some people's minds were not as effective as they possibly could have been, and will members of the Rangiora Ashley Community Board be included in that review?

Response:

Staff are continuing to work with Mainpower and the lighting supplier to address the outstanding operational issues with the fairy lights. We have had an undertaking from Mainpower to get the lights working as a priority and we

are confident the issues can be worked through and addressed. However, if these issues are not resolved to our satisfaction then an independent review of the light installation will be undertaken.

We will also be visiting the Boards in February to recap on the work undertaken to date and start talking through the next steps. It is proposed to develop an implementation plan for any future phases of work and a specialist lighting designer will be involved in these discussions. It was also requested at the January Council meeting, that a terms of reference be developed for a working group to take the feature lighting and decorations forward.

Board member M Clarke submitted the following questions for response as per Standing Orders sections 20.4, 20.5 and 20.6.

Road Carpet at Silverstream

Question:

"It has been noted that a section of the new bypass road through the Silverstream subdivision has had an overlay of road carpet on the chip seal surface. Could staff please explain the justification for this work and the sources of funding?"

Response:

A report was taken to Council Long Term Plan Deliberations in May 2018 regarding noise concerns which were raised by residents in the Silverstream Subdivision, primarily along the Butchers Road frontage.

A number of complaints had been received along with submissions as part of the Long Term Plan consultation process. Attached is a copy of **Report No. 180511051676** which presented the issues and options for Council consideration. The report was considered and approved.

As detailed in **Report No. 180511051676**, the asphalt surfacing was funded by the reallocation of \$250,000 from the Waikuku to Pegasus Connection budget, which was surplus budget.

In November 2007 a report was taken to Utilities and Roading recommending levels of service for where asphaltic concrete (hotmix) be considered. Attached is a copy of **Report No. 071108035864** which outlined the changes.

In summary the surface treatment for a road is chosen on technical grounds to ensure the lowest lifecycle cost is achieved, while at the same time taking into account environmental factors such as noise and vibration effects on residential properties. Asphaltic concrete or similar surfacing is appropriate on strategic or arterial roads in residential areas and in areas of high turning areas (such as roundabouts, cul-de-sacs and some intersections with high heavy vehicle movements). Included in the report are maps showing roads where this treatment should be considered.

3 CONFIRMATION OF MINUTES

There were no matters arising.

5 DEPUTATIONS AND PRESENTATIONS

Enterprise North Canterbury

Heather Warwick (Chief Executive, Enterprise North Canterbury) spoke to a PowerPoint Presentation (Trim 181219150836) about the role of Enterprise North Canterbury (ENC) in the district. It was noted that H Warwick had spoken to the Woodend-Sefton Community Board and would be speaking to the other boards in the future.

H Warwick noted that ENC was set up as a Council Controlled Organisation (CCO) and Not For Profit (NFP) Trust in 2002 and had been contracted by WDC to promote the Waimakariri District since 2005. H Warwick advised that the Councils appointed all ENC Trustees and recently there had been a recommendation for a new Trustee to Council. Mainpower was the major cooperate sponsor, and there were a number of other smaller sponsors for a total of \$69,000, however ENC was owned 50:50 by HDC and WDC. In Hurunui, ENC was not responsible for District promotion like it was in the Waimakariri.

H Warwick described the work streams of ENC which were Business Support and District Promotion and the funding for those. She noted that a large proportion of funding was leveraged from outside sources. It was noted that the Business Awards included a Social Enterprises Award funded through PaknSave.

H Warwick noted that the number of businesses in Waimakariri had been relatively consistent over the last number of years however the number of employees had risen as businesses expand. She noted that ENC had worked with over 3,000 businesses to date across the two districts.

H Warwick advised that ENC was contracted to provide capability assessments (CA) to local businesses and issue vouchers \$1 for \$1. Last year there were 115 one on one CA's, \$100,000 in vouchers and 200 businesses met with. ENC also assisted with online resources for businesses.

A number of training and networking events were held during the year including training courses the WDC staff attended. The last networking event had been a tour of Misco Joinery which 120 people attended. ENC offered a free 'talk with the experts session'.

ENC ran the North Canterbury Business Awards, this year they had a record number of entries.

In terms of Business attraction, ENC was the first point of call for a start-up business with Council directing enquiries of that nature to ENC. They worked with business wanting to expand in the district rather than relocate. They made introductions and linkages with existing developers, welcomed and promoted new businesses who opened through Facebook and newsletters. They worked alongside the Council's Business Centres and Communications teams.

H Warwick commented that visitor numbers were growing and were up 18% from the previous year. There were over 100 Airbnb's in the district.

H Warwick outlined product development including:

- Development of an off-road cycle trail <u>in district</u> within a year and fully promoted to Christchurch residents (1-2 years)
- Development of an off-road cycle trail through the district with first night in Kaiapoi and Surrounds (2-5 years). Working title – Wheels to Waipara.
- In discussions with developers regarding hotel and conference facilities in the District.

H Warwick commented that ENC was a busy team of five full time and five part time staff. Much of their interaction with businesses was at a time of change and they worked closely with business mentors. ENC saw their role in facilitation, collaboration and connections.

P Williams commented on the Business Awards Gala selling out in 24hours. H Warwick believed they could sell 600 tickets however there was not currently a suitable venue for an event that size. A marquee in winter did not work well and was expensive however the multi-use stadium was a potential option for the future.

TimeBank

Ruth Zahner (Chair, TimeBank) and Martin Pugh (Secretary, TimeBank) spoke to a PowerPoint presentation (Trim 181219150837) in support of the TimeBank discretionary funding application (Item 7.2).

R Zahner outlined what TimeBank was and noted that it used time as a currency, members shared skills and time, members earned/spent time credits, everyone contributed, everyone benefited and everyone's time was of equal value.

Benefits of a TimeBank were that it helped build stronger communities, provided opportunities for people to connect with each other, valued everyone equally and allowed people to give and receive.

R Zahner explained that there had been a public meeting in February 2017 which included the WDC Community Team and Councillor Peter Allen as a passionate supporter. A steering group was established in March 2017 and looked at vision, mission, objectives, studied other TimeBanks, determined interest/support from local community organisations, looked at a strategic framework, policy and membership processes, and software. The group developed branding had a logo and leaflet designed with services kindly donated from Create, Design Studio Printing.com. A copy of the brochure was distributed to members.

R Zahner explained that in 2018 a working relationship (MOU) was established with Presbyterian Support (PSUSI) who provided free office, IT support and laptop for the coordinator. In addition funding options were explored, legal and financial advice sought (Williams McKenzie and Prosser Quirke) and the constitution developed.

2018 milestones included:

- July Community Organisation Grant Scheme funding success \$8,000 received for six month pilot project.
- · August TimeBank Waimakariri Incorporated (TBW).
- September Official TBW public launch and management committee formalised.
- October Coordinator appointed. Pilot started in greater Rangiora area.

R Zahner explained how the system worked and noted that there were currently well over there target of 30 people signed up for the pilot project and there was an interest from the community. Organisations were also enquiring if they could sign up, with R Zahner noting they were looking to grow the scope of timebanking within wider Waimakariri district. In 2019 there were planned funding applications to Rata Foundation and others. TimeBank was looking to develop a relationship with a local, community-minded business for sponsorship. TimeBank would be promoted at community events. There were few community classes the Learning Exchange would help fill that gap.

M Pugh outlined his experience with TimeBank in Hurunui. He had initially joined after moving back to Canterbury as a way of connecting with the community. He commented that his experience so far had been eye opening.

P Williams queried tax liability for members. R Zahner explained that issue had been looked at with strict rules which were explained during the required orientation and signup sessions. Any skills could be traded as long as they were not skills you earnt a living with. For example a retired plumber could trade on plumbing but not one currently in business.

G Miller commented he had attended a learning exchange session in Hurunui where non-members provided a cash donation. R Zahner advised that was the kind of model they hoped to introduce in the Waimakariri. The seeds were there however the membership needed to be grown first.

D Gordon commented he had attended the launch and had been impressed with the enthusiasm and passion and asked about membership so far. R Zahner advised there were 22 signed up and 17 waiting to attend an orientation session.

In relation to funding, K Galloway asked if TimeBank would become self-funding. R Zahner explained due to the nature of TimeBank they would always need to rely on grants and donations. It was important to have someone employed as a coordinator. Next year's budget was not yet set however it was likely to be \$25,000 at least for a coordinator.

6 ADJOURNED BUSINESS

There was no adjourned business.

7 REPORTS

7.1 Request for Loading Zone alterations and carpark removal – Good Street and Gables Arcade, Rangiora – G Kempton (Engineering Technician), K Straw (Civil Projects Team Leader) and J McBride (Roading and Transport Manager)

K Straw spoke to the report which was seeking approval from the Community Board to remove three existing carparks on Good Street, alteration of an existing loading zone and installation of a new loading zone on Good Street. The concept design had been approved by the former Rangiora Community Board in May 2016.

P Williams commented that the area at the back of New World was a mess and asked if it was New World or Council land. S Hart advised that Council had entered into an arrangement to purchase three pieces of land which would allow the improvements to take place. In the interim they were working with New World regarding the unloading area. J Gerard commented that there was a major issue around safety and the land had been acquired to make the area safer.

P Williams asked if it was not better to have a business plan from New World first, before spending money on altering carparks as there was a lot of land available however it was unorganised with pallets taking up space. S Hart advised that the design had been brought to the Community Board in 2016. It included engineering reports and surveys to illustrate the design including the number of people moving in that space and the space required for larger trucks. There were three activities in that space; east bound traffic, pedestrians and deliveries and there was no way to facilitate that concurrently without widening. In 2016 the budget for the project had been approved, however the majority of funding was coming from New World.

P Williams asked should that information not have been provided in this report so that Board members had the full information as to what was happening and should they not have a business plan from New World. K Straw commented that the design had been approved by the previous Community Board, and this report was a further iteration formally ratifying the specific car parking changes. He was happy to provide the information retrospectively.

K Galloway asked how many trucks that removing the three carparks would allow. K Straw advised the proposed loading zone on Good Street was 9m. It was too small for the likes of a semi-trailer however they could turn into the

gated compound to be completely separated from pedestrians. S Hart described how the new loading zone would accommodate trucks.

K Galloway asked if trucks would be unloaded in the carpark and K Straw replied no. K Galloway noted that removing the three carparks would remove the ability of 24 cars to park and asked would the business community accept that. S Hart noted that car park surveys at peak times showed car parking to be 80% full. He believed that it was better that the considerable hazard was removed. Car parking in Rangiora was being addressed as a wider strategy.

K Galloway commented the changes were beneficial to one retailer and costly to others. S Hart referred to the safety and linkages provided by the acquired land. There were potential future projects to increase car parking. K Galloway requested S Hart to meet him to observe available car parks.

D Gordon referred to the comments of P Williams and asked what the level of consultation with the Board had been. S Hart commented that the previous Community Board had approved the concept design and there had been a number of other meetings and updates with the Community Board and Council regarding design and budget. None of those meetings had secured approval for the carparks so this report dealt with that formal request. He noted that the work was due to start at the end of January 2019.

D Gordon referred to para 5.3 and 5.4 and related to consultation and asked about when information would go to businesses regarding details of the work to be completed. K Straw advised staff would go door to door around the Gables Arcade and businesses that backed onto the laneway in the new year. They would refer to the management of traffic once the project was underway.

D Gordon referred to the reorganisation of the carpark behind the Gables and removal of the toilet - was there a partnership with New World to provide a toilet for the public within their complex. That was the understanding of S Hart and J Gerard.

R Brine asked if staff had been requested to provide copies of previous reports prior to the meeting would that have been possible for them to circulate. S Hart replied yes and noted that questions asked tonight about the design had been covered in previous reports.

R Brine asked if it was requested to lay the report on the table until February would that impact on the work; K Straw replied yes it would, it had been their understanding that the concept had been approved and this report was a formalisation to allow the loading zones to be enforced. There had been no intention to change the design.

Moved J Gerard seconded G Miller

CARRIED

J Gerard commented that the matter had been before the Council and Board for some time. To hold up the project at this stage was foolhardy in his opinion. Property owners had made it clear that it was an unsafe area. He agreed

there was a cost to the loss of three carparks but believed the gated compound which could take two trucks with one waiting was a better solution. It was a difficult area however he believed it was better to proceed after contracts had been tendered and following decisions of the previous Community Board.

G Miller advised he had been involved in the previous decision to proceed and the Community Board had been behind the project due to the current shambles of the area. He was in favour of proceeding due to concerns about safety.

R Brine completely agreed with the previous comments. He had asked the question with respect to previous reports to show that they are accessible. It was important to read the agenda and give staff an opportunity to answer questions before the meeting. The question could then be repeated at the meeting for the record. He believed the Board needed to support an important project that addressed a safety issue. With respect to the number of carparks he noted the ongoing work trying to increase the number of car parks.

P Williams commented that it was the first time it had been brought to his attention that they would be losing car parks. He believed the area at the back of New World was a mess and believed that with a business plan the area could be better managed by New World, for example removing pallets to create more room. He asked would that area be cleaned up following the changes. With regard to trucks waiting to unload that could be managed via use of a cell phone with trucks waiting away from site. He believed more information was required. He was disappointed that the work was commencing in January as it forced the Community Board to approve this evening.

D Gordon commented that he did not feel forced. There had been a lot of process up to this point and he commended staff with coming to an agreement with all parties to purchase land and get on with the development. Like others he was also concerned with the loss of carparks however felt there was a greater good around the issue of safety. Progress was being made on car parking strategies. Removing toilets from the carpark in the past had increased the number of parks available and New World had incorporated toilets in their building at no cost to ratepayers. He was sure feedback on the business plan could be fed back to New World. Issues with the back of New World were fair comment for a town centre however they also had to function.

J Gerard and J Hoult sat back from the table and D Lundy took the role of chair.

D Lundy thanked R Zahner and M Pugh for a well presented deputation.

E Cordwell explained that the grant would assist with keeping the children safe while allowing the Garden to Table programme to flourish.

Moved K Galloway seconded G Miller

(c) **Approves** a grant of \$500 to North Loburn School towards the purchase of a small garden shed.

3. BACKGROUND

3.1 Presbyterian Support is seeking funding towards the cost of an event which seeks to reduce social isolation and enhance wellbeing amongst older people: An Expo of Ideas to Live Well and Give Well.

4. ISSUES AND OPTIONS

- 4.1. **Presbyterian Support** organised an inaugural Older Person's Expo event on Wednesday 28 February 2018 with the theme Live and Give. The 2018 expo attracted over 300 participants, with 25 local organisations taking part and was focussed on reducing social isolation and enhancing wellbeing.
- 4.2. It is proposed to hold a similar event, utilising the learnings from last year, on Thursday 21 March 2019. It is anticipated that over 400 people will attend of whom approximately 85% will be from the Board's community area.
- 4.3. The event will utilise and reflect on research seeking to mitigate the impact of social isolation and declining mental health in older people. It seeks to build individual and community resilience with a further aim to reduce mental illness and suicide in the older age group. Multiple agencies will collaborate to run and participate in the expo which also fits with the Council's Age Friendly Community Strategy. It will also showcase opportunities to receive and give service and connection in the Waimakariri community.
- 4.4. The event is also being financially supported by Pegasus Health and the Rural Public Health Organisation with further funds being sought from Lions and Rotary. These latter funds are not yet confirmed.
- 4.5. The group received \$500 from the Board in December 2017 towards the costs of the 2018 event. All financial information and Accountability Forms have been received.
- 4.6. The Management team have reviewed this report.

Information to assist groups with their application

The purpose of the Board discretionary grants is to assist projects that enhance community group capacity and/or increase participation in activities.

When assessing grant applications the Board considers a number of factors in its decision making. These include, but are not limited to; type of project, time frame, benefits to the community and costs being contributed. The more information you as a group can provide on the project and benefits to participants the better informed the Board is. You are welcome to include a cover letter as part of your application. The decision to grant funds is the sole discretion of the Board.

The Board cannot accept applications from individuals. All funding is paid to non-profit community based organisations, registered charities or incorporated societies. Council funding is publicly accountable therefore the Board needs to demonstrate to the community where funding is going and what it is being spent on. This is one of the reasons the Board requires a copy of your financial profit/loss statements and balance sheet for the previous/current financial year. Staff cannot process your application without financial records.

The Board encourages applicants, where practically possible, to consider using local businesses or suppliers for any services or goods they require in their application. The Board acknowledges that this may result in a higher quote.

It would be helpful to the Board to receive an expense summary for projects that cost more than the grant being requested to show the areas where funds are being spent and a paragraph on what fund raising the group has undertaken towards the project, or other sources considered (ie voluntary labour, businesses for supplies).

Examples (but not limited to) of what the Board cannot fund:

- **×** Wages
- **★** Debt servicing
- ➤ Payment for volunteers (including arrangements in kind eg petrol vouchers)
- **★** Stock or capital market investment
- **×** Gambling or prize money
- Funding of individuals (only non-profit organisations)
- Payment of any legal expenditure or associated costs
- ➤ Purchase of land and buildings
- * Activities or initiatives where the primary purpose is to promote, commercial or profit-oriented interests
- Payment of fines, court costs or mediation costs, IRD penalties

Examples (but not limited to) of what the Board can fund:

- ✓ New equipment
- √ Toys/educational aids
- √ Sporting equipment
- √ Safety equipment
- ✓ Costs associated with events
- ✓ Community training



Criteria for application

- Grant applications will be considered every month by the Rangiora-Ashley Community Board. Applications are recommended to be received three weeks prior to Board meeting dates for processing.
- Generally funding grants will be a maximum of \$500 in any one financial year (July 2018 to June 2019) but the group can apply up to twice in that year, providing it is for different projects.
- The grant funding is limited to projects within the Board area or primarily benefiting the residents of the ward.
- Applications will only be accepted from non-profit community-based organisations, registered charities or incorporated societies.
- · The group should have strong links with the Rangiora-Ashley community.
- The application should clearly state the purpose for which the money is to be used.
- The applicant should submit a 1-2 page balance sheet and an income and expenditure statement which shows their current financial assets and liabilities. Applications cannot be processed until financial information is received.
- Where possible, or feasible, applicants must declare other sources from which funding has been applied for, or granted from, for the project being applied to the Rangiora-Ashley Community Board.
- The Board supports a wide range of community activities but the application will only be considered if it is deemed of the nature listed in the table of examples of what the Board can fund (see previous page).
- An accountability form must be provided to the Council outlining how the funds were applied, within
 six months of the grant being allocated, when funds are spent, or prior to a new application. A new
 application will not be accepted until the previous accountability form has been completed and returned.
 The group should maintain accurate records around the grant including, but not limited to: receipts,
 banks statements and invoices. In the event that funds are not spent on the project or activity applied
 for the recipient may be required to return the grant funding to the Council.
- If the activity/event for which funds have been granted does not take place or if the group does not
 provide the information to enable the grant to be paid within six months of approval of the grant being
 notified, then in both cases the application will be regarded as closed and funds released for reallocation
 by the Board.

- 4.2. This National Conference is held every two years and is considered an invaluable networking and idea gathering conference that is current and relevant to Community Boards as it showcases innovative and inspiring ways that Councils and Boards accept the challenges that comes with leadership in our communities.
- 4.3. The Rangiora-Ashley Community Board has a training allowance of \$15,280 for the 2018-19 financial year. The Board has sufficient balance available in the budget to put towards members attending this conference. Priority consideration is recommended to be given to members that have not attended before.
- 4.4. **Full Registration**: The cost of the full registration is \$755 including GST for the early bird registration. Early bird registrations close at the end of February. From 1 March 2019 the standard registration will increase to \$855 including GST. Full registration includes attendance at all conference business sessions and workshops, handbook, daily catering, one ticket to Thursday's welcome reception at Len Lye Gallery, one ticket to Friday's evening conference dinner at the Devon Hotel and one ticket to Saturday evening's function (optional) at the Devon Hotel.

Partner Registration: The cost of your partner's registration is \$210 including GST and includes a handbook, one ticket to the Thursday's Welcome reception at Len Lye Gallery, one ticket to Friday evening's conference dinner at the Devon Hotel and one ticket to Saturday evening's function at the Devon Hotel. If partners wish to travel to the conference the additional costs would be personally met by the Board member. Additional activities would be the personal responsibility of the Board member and partner.

- 4.5. **Accommodation:** Rooms are available at the Devon Hotel at the cost of \$183 and includes ensuite bathroom, tea/coffee making facilities and have either one or two beds.
- 4.6. **Transport:** Direct flights from Christchurch to New Plymouth currently cost approximately \$100. Alternative afternoon flights with a brief stop in Auckland or Wellington are approximately \$250 one way. Members would have a choice of returning on the Saturday evening or Sunday. All flights on the Saturday evening involve one stop and cost approximately \$200 one way. Sunday flights cost approximately \$200.
- 4.7. Transport to and from airports and hotel is estimated at \$250 per person and an additional contingency of \$100 per person to cover incidentals such as breakfasts or non-alcoholic drinks.

- 4.8. The conference welcome commences early evening on 11 April and recommended travel would be the Thursday afternoon from Christchurch. The conference finishes midafternoon Saturday 13 April, with an optional evening function available. Members could return on early evening Saturday or incur an additional nights accommodation and return Sunday 14 April.
- 4.9. **Report Back**: The attendees will be expected to write a formal report on the conference sharing ideas/knowledge gained and present the report at their respective Board's May 2019 meeting. This report should reflect their own experience of the conference and will be published in the May agenda.
- 4.10. Potentially other training opportunities could come before the Boards prior to 30 June 2019, which include Local Government New Zealand 'know how' seminars which average \$700 per day or several webinars at approximately \$150 each. The current budget would enable additional training opportunities to be considered should they arise.
- 4.11. A member of the Governance Team may be in attendance at the Conference if a large contingent of members attend the conference. Costs associated with the staff member would be met from the Governance operational training budget.
- 4.12. The Management Team have reviewed this report and support the recommendations.

5. COMMUNITY VIEWS

5.1. This conference is a primary networking and idea sharing opportunity that will be of benefit to members in their role to assist the community that they serve. Community views have not been sought.

6. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS AND RISKS

6.1. Each Board has a training/conference budget for the 2018-19 financial year. The Rangiora-Ashley Community Board's budget has a balance of \$15,280 available for members to attend the Conference. The indicative cost of attendance per Board member is \$1,821. A summary of indicative costs is outlined below:

- 2.4. As at 30 June 2018, four Accountability Forms are outstanding.
- 2.5. Rotary Club of Rangiora requested funds to assist in the building of a fitness circuit, with up to twelve stations, along the Rakahuri Trail. The fitness trail has seven exercise stations completed with the possibility of more to be added depending of funding from Environment Canterbury. The facility was opened by Mayor David Ayers on 16 June 2018.
- 2.6. Southbrook School Parent Teachers used fund towards a new cordless scanner for the school library. With this equipment it has enabled both staff and student volunteers to quickly and easily scan books. It will also make the end of year stock take easier as staff will be able to scan books in each class room instead of moving them to the library and back.
- 2.7. North Canterbury Musical Society used the funds towards the signage for its costume hire initiative to raise funding for ongoing musicals and buildings at Northbrook Studios. Signage has been erected on Rangiora/Woodend Road and Cones Road.
- 2.8. International Day Older Persons used the funding for hiring a hall and arranging entertainment during afternoon tea arranged to celebrate International day. Approximately 100 people attended and enjoyed both the entertainment and the tea.
- 2.9. Canterbury Westland Kindergarten requested funding for the purchase of the replacement of damaged books and also to purchase some new large books. These books are used by the children attending the kindergarten, their siblings and extended families. The books are also used for small group sessions and read to individual children.
- 2.10. Rangiora Croquet Club used the funds towards the cost of replacing the dishwasher at the clubrooms. This has been a great help as club volunteers took turns washing cups and crockery by hand for groups of up to 32 people at a time. The new dishwasher is much appreciated and saves time.

- 2.11. Loburn School used the funding towards 27 Year 8 students participating in the William Pike Challenge Award and have completed the Rakahuri Rage Mountain Bike event and tramped to Hawdon Hut and walked through Cave Stream.
- 2.12. Trinity Methodist Mainly Music used the funding to create a lockable storage room for sound equipment. The lockable storage room now has shelving to help organise the equipment. Normally our children numbers are between 20 and 30 children per session and the last two weeks of term 4, after the completion of the project, the programmed welcomed 45 children per session.
- 2.13. Cust Bowling Club put the funding towards the purchase of a second hand mower from the Kirwee Bowling Club, for mowing its greens.
- 2.14. Waimakariri Arts Trust Kaiapoi Art used the funds towards the running of the Kaiapoi Art and Schools Expo in particular advertising in the Northern Outlook. The Expo was a huge success with increase in sales and visitor numbers. This was, in turn, good for the local cafes and restaurants.
- 2.15. Rangiora Districts Early Records Society used the funds towards the cost of replacing its scanner. This is used for scanning photographs from our extensive archival collection in preparation for recording them in our Past Perfect database and for archiving and scanning photographs for copies when requested by the public, businesses or the Council.
- 2.16. McAlpines Canterbury Pipe Band utilised the funds for purchasing new flashes for their uniforms and wore them at the first contest of the season in December 2018.
- 2.17. North Canterbury Athletics Club purchased ten new Club competition singlets for its children athletes aged between 7 and 14 years old. The new children entering the club over the winter cross country season have been busy successfully competing in events such as the Woodend Relays, Canterbury Cross Country Championships at Halswell Quarry and many other events. The club has 33 children during the winter months and at least double that competing in track and field events over the summer season.
- 2.18. Rangiora Playcentre used the funds towards purchasing a wide range of sensory and touch based play materials. The development of this area within the centre is nearing completion. The resources ensure that both our youngest and oldest tamariki have many opportunities to explore, grow and develop.
- 2.19. Ashley Playcentre requested fund to go towards printing costs by way of purchasing printer cartridges. Printing is used extensively for providing quality learning stories for the tamariki and provide permanent memories and tracking of each child's growth and development.
- 2.20. North Canterbury Academy of Music put the funds towards the cost of producing the end of year concert. The funding went towards the hiring of the Rangiora Town Hall Auditorium for rehearsals and the Concerts held on 23rd and 24th November 2018. The concert was well attended.
- 2.21. Friends of Rangiora Town Hall requested funding for the CCTV system for the stage and green rooms. This project was scheduled to take place in November/December 2018 but was delayed. The project will be completed in the first guarter of 2019.
- 2.25 North Canterbury Academy of Music utilised the funds towards the purchase of a replacement drum set. This has meant that the tutor does not have to use his own

personal equipment and also enabled students to take part in the end of year concert held in November 2018.

- 2.22. According to the Board's Grant Criteria, Accountability Forms are due within six months of the grant being allocated, when funds are spent, or prior to a new application.
- 2.23. The Rangiora-Ashley Community Board was allocated \$12,264 to its 2017-18 Discretionary Fund and has distributed \$10,347 during the year. The remaining \$1,917 in the 2017-18 budget was carried over to the 2018-19 budget.
- 2.24. Staff will continue to keep in contact with the groups to make sure the Accountability Forms are returned within six months of the grant being allocated, as outlined in the letter sent to successful applicants.
- 2.25. If the group make any applications in the future, they will be reminded that it will not be considered by the Board until the Accountability Form from past applications has been completed and returned.
- 2.26. The Management Team has reviewed this report.

grow by more than 30,000 over the next 30 years, from 58,000 to between 85,000 and 100,000.

The proportion of residents over the age of 65 in the district is set to grow from around 18 percent of the population to around 33%, which carries all sorts of implications for housing, healthcare, community services, employment opportunities and volunteering.

Presbyterian Support volunteer coordinator Roni Jordan says the prospects are both exciting and challenging.

"It's quite interesting, especially the difference between Rangiora and Rolleston - they are polar opposites. Rangiora has an older population and Rolleston is attracting a younger population.

"I think it will be important to have good interactions between older and younger people, which is why it's quite nice to have the Ashley School kapa haka group coming to our celebration. rather than just having old time singing."

She believes a growing older population, maintaining good health for longer will see people retiring at an older age.

"I think people will continue to work into their 70s.

"The type of work we are doing has changed and we are very lucky to live in a community which is supportive of all age groups."

Ms Jordan says Presbyterian Support has been associated with local International Day of the Older Person events for nearly 20 years.

Local events began in 1999 when local women Valda Reveley, Edna van der Loon and Donna Abernethy came together to form a small organising committee and all three continue to be involved in the event, Ms Jordan says.

This year's event is expected to have up to 120 people attending, including a large contingent making the trip down from Culverden.

"It's really a celebration of older people and their worth in our community," Ms Jordan says.

"There has been a lot of interest from retirement villages and having a group from Culverden is going to be amazing."

She says items from the Northbrook Museum were going to be placed on a display table to encourage discussion on yesteryear and attendees were encouraged to wear something from "through the years".

Other entertainment was going to be provided by country singers, a tai chi demonstration and 30 students from Ashley School performing kapa haka.

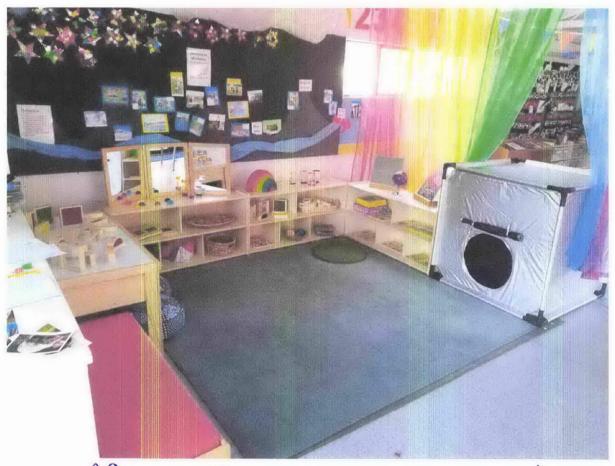

- 3.4. As at 31 December 2018, eight Accountability Forms are outstanding.
- 3.5. North Canterbury Model Railway Club Inc requested funds to purchase a promotional sign for the Sunday Markets held in the carpark at Blake Street. These markets, held on the third Sunday of the month, raise funds which go towards maintenance of the clubrooms. The increase in a steady flow of visitors all day has been pleasing.
- 3.6. The North Canterbury Citizens Advice Bureau utilised the funds to hold a celebration to commemorate its 40th Anniversary. Funds were used to purchase refreshments, printing of invitations and the hall hire. The two hour event was held for current and former volunteers, life members and supporters.
- 3.7. The McAlpines North Canterbury Pipe Band Inc sent James Paterson to attend the Royal New Zealand Pipe Band Acadamy Summer School. Attached is a thank you letter from James.
- 3.8. The Rangiora Croquet Club Inc utilized the funding to purchase a compressor and install an electrical supply to the equipment shed. The compressor is needed for inflating mower tyres and to clean grass clippings form the mower blades and clean the mower itself.
- 3.9. According to the Board's Grant Criteria, Accountability Forms are due within six months of the grant being allocated, when funds are spent, or prior to a new application.
- 3.10. The Rangiora-Ashley Community Board was allocated \$10,400 to its 2018-19 Discretionary Fund and has distributed \$4,423 during the first part of the financial year. The remaining \$5,977 is available for allocation until the end of the financial year on 30 June 2019.

Citizens Advice Turns 40

This year the North Canterbury Citizens Advice Bureau (CAB) celebrates forty years of service in the region. It has come a long way since its humble beginnings in an old bike shop on what is today the lawn of the Council Offices.

When the Bureau was first established in 1978, it was in response to public concerns about the growing community and related social issues. Today as North Canterbury continues to grow the Bureau continues to provide a vital service to everyone who needs it – from newcomers to those experiencing problems or worries in life that they want to talk over. The Bureau's 42 trained Volunteers deal with over 4,000 calls annually and the number is growing.

Technology also means that the Bureau is now far more intricately linked with their nationwide network than they were in the early days. Information about all of New Zealand is at their fingertips and they also field calls from around the country in mutual support with the 82 other bureaux around the country.

Bureau volunteers know what people's rights are, the help that is available and, most importantly, how to access it. And the support they provide is tremendously varied with clients of all ages, genders and races. There is no typical Bureau client.

"No two days are the same", says volunteer and Board Chair Margaret Finnie. Calls can range from a client requiring information about local clubs and activities. Or maybe more complex like consumer issues, tenancy, neighbour disputes, or a mother terrified by her ex-partner is going to be awarded custody of their children. "Life can be hard" says Margaret, "And sometimes people just want to talk things through". And volunteers are happy for them to do so. No question is too big or too small.

The Bureau can also assist in many other ways. They have a free legal service, their own JP's, curriculum vitae assistance, migrant clinic, language translation services and they are the booking agents for the St John Health Shuttle.

Additional information to support accountability for grant of \$400.00 to the Rangiora Croquet Club Inc. made by the Rangiora-Ashley Community Board on 13 November 2018.

At the outset we estimated that this project would cost in the vicinity of \$800.00. The compressor and the electrical cabling were purchased at discounted prices. The physical work to undertake the installation of the cabling along the side of the River Road building was undertaken by a member under supervision from an electrician who provided this at no cost to the club.

Since it re-opened in November 2015 the members of the Rangiora Croquet Club Inc. have undertaken all the maintenance of their lawns, which are regarded as having a first class surface, among the best in Canterbury. Until now those looking after the lawns have madedo without a compressor and have had to look to members for equipment when tyres need to be inflated, in particular. Other methods have been used to clear the mower blades and other parts of lawn clippings. With the assistance of the grant from the Rangiora-Ashley Community Board the task of maintaining the mower will be come much easier. As the club moves to its next project, the establishment of a further two lawns on the land immediately to the north of the current lawns, having this equipment connected to the electricity will be even more important.

In terms of beneficiaries, the club now has 44 members with eight people having joined us this summer season and seven of these people are new to croquet. In December the club held a primary schools croquet tournament involving teams from the Loburn North School, St Patrick's School (Kaiapoi) and Ouruhia School. This is understood to be the first event of its kind in Canterbury and possibly in New Zealand. During the Christmas Holidays the club has run a school holiday programme which has attracted up to 12 children. There have been requests for this programme to continue in some form after the children return to school. In term 1 of 2019 the club also anticipates there being some interest from Rangiora High School student in playing croquet, as part of their sports programme. The club is working with high school staff to offer students the opportunity to try croquet and has also organized for a Christchurch based coach, who is one of New Zealand's leading croquet players to offer coaching to Rangiora High School students at the beginning of the 2019-20 playing season in September/October 2019.

The work that the Rangiora Croquet Club is doing to interest school aged children in croquet is part of a New Zealand wide initiative called "Youth Croquet" supported by Croquet NZ. Croquet NZ has also supported the club by making its national coach, Greg Bryant, available to provide a clinic for members as the very reasonable charge of \$10.00 per person. This was attended by approximately 20 current members of the club.

The Rangiora-Ashley Community Board ("the Board") wish to oppose the proposed application for an off-licence by Rangiora Liquormart Limited at 238-256 High Street Rangiora, known as Black Bull Liquor Rangiora.

Right to Object

The Board believe they met the criteria of objection (Sale and Supply of Alcohol Act 2012 S102(1)) by having a greater interest in the application than the public generally, as they are an unincorporated body independently elected to represent the 21,900 residents of the Rangiora-Ashley wards, of whom over 17,200 are resident in Rangiora, and mandated to (a) represent, and act as an advocate for, the interests of its community; and (b) consider and report on all matters referred to it by the Council, or any matter of interest or concern to the Board (LGA 2002, s52). It is unclear as to the overarching company responsible for the licence and establishment.

Section 6b of the Application states that the Trading name for the premises will be Black Bull Liquor Rangiora. Section 2a states that the company name for the licence is Rangiora Liquormart limited.

Following preliminary research Black Bull Liquor is a trading name of Thirsty Liquor. The Board urges that clarification of the relationship of the Applicants to Thirsty Liquor should be clarified given that there is already a Thirsty Liquor trading at 398 High Street, Rangiora.

Thirsty Liquor purchased the naming rights to the Black Bull Liquor brand in July 2015. The acquisition added 12 new stores to the group immediately and this ...

Suitability of the Applicants - Sale and Supply of Alcohol Act 2012 Part 2 s105 (b)

As permitted in the Sale and Supply of Alcohol Act 2012 s105(b) the Board oppose the granting of a licence based on the information provide in the application.

The Board explicitly notes that the two Directors, namely Sahil Sharma and Aman Singh have both been convicted of <u>Drink Driving offences and Disqualified from Driving.</u> Aman Singh on two occasions in 2008 and 2009 and Sahil Sharma in 2011.

The Board is concerned at the lack of detail as to the seriousness of the offences as well as the length of the disqualification period for both Directors.

The Board does not consider that this is acceptable for Directors of such an establishment.

All Directors of the company reside in Lower Hutt and the Board is concerned that the level of oversight and monitoring of the proposed Off Licence will be considerably affected by this.

Less than Minor - Impact on Amenity and Good Order of Locality: Sale and Supply of Alcohol Act 2012 Part 2 s105 (h)

The Board objects to the application as there are sufficient Off Licence outlets already in the vicinity of the proposed premises. Rangiora Liquor Centre is less than 100 metres away at 320 High Street, together with Thirsty Liquor at 398 High Street, Super Liquor at 28 High Street and Liquorland at 73 Victoria Street.

<u>Proximity to schools and areas used by all of the community including children, youth and vulnerable adults</u>

The proposed premise is close to both Rangiora Borough School and Dudley Park.

The Board would appreciate the opportunity to speak to the District Licensing Committee at the appropriate time, in opposition to the application by Rangiora Liquormart Limited.

1. SUMMARY

- 1.1 This report is to brief Council on noise concerns raised by residents in the Silverstream subdivision, and primarily along the existing Butchers Road frontage.
- 1.2 Staff have received a number of complaints regarding road noise and requests for asphalt surfacing on the new road, as well as requests for replacement of existing fencing.
- 1.3 Four submissions requesting asphalt surfacing have been received as part of the Long Term Plan process and have been heard by Council.
- 1.4 The New Arterial Road in the 60km/h section (currently Butchers Road and Giles Road) will be resurfaced with asphalt in the next three to five years, depending on traffic volumes and how the existing surfacing performs.
- 1.5 There is no funding currently allocated for either asphalt surfacing or replacement fencing.

2. <u>RECOMMENDATION</u>

THAT the Council:

- (a) **Receives** report No. 180511051676;
- (b) **Approves** resurfacing of the northern half of the New Arterial Road from the Kaiapoi River bridge north along Butchers Road to the 60/80km speed limit change at the northern end of the development with an asphalt surface at a cost for \$250,000, and;
- (c) **Approves** the reallocation of \$250,000 from the Waikuku to Pegasus Connection budget of \$605,000 to allow for the funding of the asphalt surfacing.
- (d) **Approves** the resurfacing of the southern half of the New Arterial Road (from west of Island Rd to the Kaiapoi River bridge) with an asphalt surface in the next 3 to 5 years, with staff to submit a request for funding in the 2021-24 NZTA funding bid and 2021-31 LTP.
- (e) **Notes** that if Council does reallocating budget from the Waikuku to Pegasus Connection budget that it is not subsidised by NZTA.

- (f) **Notes** that this is unlikely to qualify for NZTA subsidy because it does not yet meet NZTA Guidelines or Council Policy requirements, and the final NZTA 'bid' for the 2018-21 period has already been submitted and assessed.
- (g) **Notes** that if Council decides to resurface Butchers Road adjacent the existing houses it will come under pressure to seal the remainder of the New Arterial Road in the 60km/h area when the new houses are built and occupied.

3. BACKGROUND

- 3.1 The New Arterial Road project was overseen by a Project Control Group (PCG) which included staff from Council's Utilities & Roading Team, Project Delivery Unit, Planning Team and also included the Developer.
- 3.2 Noise was considered as part of the design process and it was agreed that this would be managed by using the smallest sized chip seal and a lower speed limit in an effort to minimise noise.
- 3.3 The PCG considered the appropriate surface for the New Arterial Road and concluded that a two coat chip seal (Grade 4&6) was appropriate. This is the same surfacing used in urban streets.
- 3.4 The existing fence along the Butchers Road frontage was a requirement of the resource consent for the subdivision and has specific design requirements which are consent noticed on the property titles.
- 3.5 It is noted that the road was shown on the Outline Development Plan and as such all property purchasers were made aware of the road.
- 3.6 The District Plan exempts noise from having to be considered for the New Arterial Road as set out in clause 31.12.2.4. This exemption was approved as part of LURP Action 47 which was issued by the Minister of Earthquake Recovery.
- 3.7 Cost was a factor as the project budget did not allow for a quieter asphalt surface.

4. ISSUES AND OPTIONS

- 4.1. It is acknowledged that as traffic volumes increase and in particular as more heavy vehicles use the route, an asphalt surface will be required at some stage in the future. NZTA have guidelines for assessing noise and when a low noise surfacing can be justified.
- 4.2. Council policy is that all Arterial and Strategic urban roads in residential areas will be surfaced with asphalt surfacing when they are next resurfaced. That means that when Butchers Road is due for a reseal it will be resealed with asphalt. Butchers Road adjacent to the houses is considered an urban road and as the current speed limit of 60km/h, is less than the 70km/h speed limit which is required to define an urban road.
- 4.3. In the "business as usual" sense the trigger for resurfacing Butchers Road with an asphalt surface is when the road is next due for resurfacing. A two coat chip seal surface would be expected to last at least 5 years depending on traffic volumes and heavy vehicle use. Meeting NZTA guidelines depends on traffic growth and it is estimated it would be at least 3 years before that would be met.
- 4.4. It is important to note that the asphalt surfacing will help reduce tyre noise from vehicles travelling along the road, however it will not have any impact on engine noise coming from vehicles utilising the road.
- 4.5. The existing properties along Butchers Road have a 1.5m high wooden paling fence along the road frontage. This fence was a requirement of the resource consent which was issued for the subdivision.

- 4.6. The resource consent for the subdivision required a fence to be constructed to a specified design and that a consent notice be registered on the title of each property fronting the road.
- 4.7. The existing fence has been raised to a height of 1.8m at the southern end of Butchers Road where the new road ramps up to the bridge over the Kaiapoi River. It was agreed to raise the fence in this location as the new road was lifted significantly adjacent to three properties, which resulted in a significant reduction in privacy for the property owners. Staff have also been agreed to raise the fence for the four properties at the northern end of Silverstream for the same reason.
- 4.8. The options available to Council are as follows:

a) Option One - Programme Resurfacing

This option would involve programming the asphalt resurfacing work in the next 3 to 5 years, with staff to submit a request for funding in the 2021-24 NZTA funding bid and 2021-31 LTP.

b) Option Two – Asphalt Surfacing (Along Butchers Road frontage)

This option would involve Council agreeing to overlay the new road with a layer of asphalt from the Kaiapoi River Bridge through to the northern end of the subdivision on Butchers Road.

To achieve this Council would need to add \$250,000 to the LTP to resurface this part of Butchers Road with asphalt. This is unlikely to qualify for NZTA subsidy because it does not yet meet NZTA Guidelines or Council Policy requirements and the final NZTA 'bid' for the 2018-21 period has already been submitted and assessed.

c) Option Three - Asphalt Surfacing (Along full length adjacent to Silverstream)

This option would involve Council agreeing to overlay the new road with a layer of asphalt from the Island Road intersection through to the northern end of the subdivision on Butchers Road.

To achieve this Council would need to add \$500,000 to the LTP to resurface the length of the New Arterial Road adjacent to Silverstream with asphalt. This is unlikely to qualify for NZTA subsidy because it does not yet meet NZTA Guidelines or Council Policy requirements and the final NZTA 'bid' for the 2018-21 period has already been submitted and assessed.

d) Option Four – Replacement of Fencing along the Butchers Road Frontage

This options would involve Council agreeing to replace the existing paling fence along the Butchers Road frontage. As noted above this would include the need to secure a resource consent for the change to the fencing and legal costs associated with the change in consent notices which would be required on the affected lots.

The cost to replace the fencing is estimated as being \$100,000 for the removal of the existing fences and construction of new fences and estimated \$50,000 to \$100,000 in costs for the consenting and legal work associated with the changes to the consent notices. Therefore Council would need to add \$200,000 to the LTP for replacement fencing.

e) Option Five – Full Length Asphalt Surfacing as well as Replacement of Fencing along the Butchers Road Frontage

This would be a combination of Options Three and Four with a total cost of approximately \$700,000, which would need to be added to the LTP.

4.9. The Management Team have reviewed this report and support the recommendations.

5. COMMUNITY VIEWS

- 5.1. Groups and Organisations
- 5.2. No specific consultation has been undertaken on this matter.
- 5.3. Wider Community
- 5.4. A number of complaints have been received regarding road noise along with four submissions to the Long Term Plan deliberations.

6. IMPLICATIONS AND RISKS

- 6.1. Financial Implications
- 6.2. There is no budget allocated for asphalt surfacing or replacement fencing.
- 6.3. The budget included in the LTP and the NZTA programme does not allow for resurfacing Butchers Road with asphalt in the next three years.
- 6.4. If Council decided to approve additional funding it is unlikely to qualify for NZTA funding as it does not meet the necessary triggers. Also the NZTA final bid has been submitted / assessed and it is very unlikely additional funding would be approved at this late stage. The best chance of obtaining NZTA subsidy would be by including it in the 2021-24 programme bid.
- 6.5. The estimated cost of resurfacing Butchers Road adjacent to the existing houses is \$250,000. The estimated cost of resurfacing the full length in the 60km/h area is \$500,000. To put that into context the total annual resurfacing budget for the whole district is \$1.95m.
- 6.6. Cost was a factor as the project budget did not allow for a quieter asphalt surface or for fencing replacement.
- 6.7. The estimated cost to raise the remainder of the fences along Butchers Road is approximately \$200,000. A resource consent would be required to allow for the fence to be changed and the consent notice on the lots to be changed. The estimated cost of fencing includes the physical replacement as well as legal costs associated with changes to consent notices.
- 6.8. The current budget allocated to the Waikuku to Pegasus Cycleway Upgrade is \$605,000. The budget was originally approved for connectivity projects including the sealing of Kaiapoi Pa Road. Consultation was carried out and it was concluded that sealing of the road was not a desired outcome for the community. It was agreed to instead upgrade and seal a walking and cycling link between Waikuku and Pegasus. The total approved tender cost for this work was \$178,000. The Pegasus developer had paid a financial contribution of \$140,000 towards the sealing of Kaiapoi Pa Road, which will need to be paid back as this work is not proceeding. This will leave \$278,000 which could be reallocated to allow for the asphalt surfacing on the New Arterial Road along the Butchers Road frontage.

6.9. Community Implications

- 6.10. Road noise can be affected by various factors including the road surface, vehicle type, tyre type, volume and the speed of traffic using a road.
- 6.11. The effect of road noise will vary between individuals and can cause annoyance.

6.12. Risk Management

6.13. Normal construction risks will apply.

6.14. Health and Safety

6.15. Should any physical works be required to be carried out then the contractor will be required to provide a Site Specific Health & Safety Plan for approval, prior to work commencing on site.

7. CONTEXT

7.1. Policy

This matter is not a matter of significance in terms of the Council's Significance and Engagement Policy.

7.2. Legislation

This project will be subject to the *Resource Management Act 1991* and Regional Plan Rules and resource consent requirements.

7.3. Community Outcomes

This report consider the following outcomes:

1. SUMMARY

The purpose of this report is to recommend a change to the current level of service as included in the Roading Activity Management Plan for where asphaltic concrete (hotmix) or similar road surfacing is used.

The current level of service for road surfacing is defined in the Roading Activity Management Plan and its wording is such that it could lead to inconsistencies and discontinuous lengths of roads with asphaltic concrete surfacing, particularly the rule that roads carrying 10,000 vpd are surfaced with asphaltic concrete.

With the strategic and arterial roads through the urban residential areas of Kaiapoi and Rangiora carrying higher traffic volumes the quality of life of people living on these roads can be adversely affected by noise and vibration. For this reason determining the surfacing type by traffic volume alone may not lead to logical and good outcomes. Determining the surfacing type by road hierarchy may be a better approach.

There is a need to better define where asphaltic concrete (hotmix) or similar surfacing is used to give more certainty for those living on strategic and arterial roads, and when developing future programmes.

It is proposed to use asphaltic concrete (hotmix) or similar surfacing on strategic and arterial roads from the residential boundaries in Kaiapoi and Rangiora, regardless of traffic volume. It is proposed to continue its use in cul-de-sac heads and other areas where it is the most appropriate technical and cost effective option. This will generally be where there are high turning movements.

2. RECOMMENDATION

THAT the Utilities and Roading Committee:

- (a) Receives report N° 071108035864.
- (b) Recommends to Council that they adopt the attached Level of Service for the use of Asphaltic Concrete (or similar) surfacing on roads, and amend the Roading Activity Management Plan accordingly.

(c) **Notes** the financial implications of this recommendation on rates are an extra \$48,000 per annum when fully implemented, increasing at a rate of \$7,000 per year.

3. BACKGROUND

- 3.1. The Roading Activity Management Plan defines the level of service for road surfacing and noise and vibration as follows: -
 - Urban strategic and arterial roads to be surfaced with asphaltic concrete (hotmix) to reduce road surface noise where there are 10,000 or more vehicles per day.
 - Seal all cul-de-sacs in hotmix or similar product to reduce wear and tear from turning vehicles.
 - Where the use of asphaltic concrete surfacing is the most appropriate and cost effective method for removing depressions and inconsistencies in vertical and horizontal alignment, especially in urban streets,
 - Asphaltic concrete for surfacing intersections where there are large numbers of turning heavy vehicles.
- 3.2. The following roads in the District carry more than 10,000vpd according to the latest traffic counts.

Williams Street – Ohoka Road to Charles Street
Lineside Road – State Highway boundary to Flaxton Road
Southbrook Road – Flaxton Road to South Belt
Percival Street – South Belt to Victoria Street
Northbrook Road – Victoria Street to Ivory Street
Ashley Street – High Street to Blackett Street

- 3.3. The current wording is likely to cause inconsistencies as the strict 10,000 vpd rule will result in discontinuous lengths of asphaltic concrete (hotmix) surfacing on some routes. For example Southbrook Road, Percival St, and Northbrook Road to Ivory Street carry more than 10,000vpd but Ivory Street carries less than 10,000vpd, then Ashley Street between High St and Blackett Street carries more than 10,000vpd.
- 3.4. A section of Ashley Street in the vicinity of Kingsbury Ave is due for resealing this year and because the surface is uneven with many old trenches the most appropriate and cost effective treatment is asphaltic concrete (hotmix).
- 3.5. This section of Ashley Street could be resurfaced with asphaltic concrete (hotmix) without necessarily getting the Committee's approval because it is the most appropriate and cost effective option. The next section of Ashley Street, between Blackett Street and Kingsbury Ave is due for resurfacing within the next couple of years and because this section is relatively smooth the use of asphaltic concrete (hotmix) will not be able to be justified solely on being the most appropriate and cost effective treatment. This would then result in some sections of Ashley Street being surfaced with asphaltic concrete (hotmix) and some sections being chipsealed.
- 3.6. Because of the potential problems with the current level of service a draft level of service has been developed so as to better define where asphaltic concrete (hotmix) or similar surfacing will be used to give more certainty for residents and for planning and programming.
- 3.7. The basic principle behind the draft level of service is that asphaltic concrete (hotmix), or similar surfacing should be the preferred surfacing on strategic and arterial roads from

the residential boundaries in Kaiapoi and Rangiora due to the high traffic volumes and the effect of noise and vibration.

- 3.8. Under the draft level of service these roads would be resurfaced with asphaltic concrete or similar surfacing next time they are due for resurfacing and not immediately on approval of the draft level of service.
- 3.9. The exception to this is in the case where more resurfacing is due in any one year than the budget allows. In these cases the roads with the highest volume will be resurfaced with asphaltic concrete (hotmix) or similar surfacing first and the other roads will be sealed with a small sized chip seal to extend their life for up to three years and then they will be resurfaced with asphaltic concrete (hotmix) or similar surfacing.
- 3.10. It is possible that this will apply to Williams Street north of Smith Street this year. Because this year's funding is being used to resurface Williams Street with asphaltic concrete between Ohoka Road and the railway line, and sections of Ashley Street and Ivory Street are due for resurfacing over the next two years, and have roughness problems, then the section of Williams Street north of Smith Street is a lower priority.
- 3.11. Asphaltic concrete (hotmix) or similar surfacing should also be used where it is the most appropriate treatment on technical and cost grounds. Generally this will be at all cul-desac turning heads, at intersections with high heavy vehicle turning movements and in industrial areas where there are high heavy vehicle turning movements. It may also be the most appropriate and cost effect treatment method for removing depressions and inconsistencies in vertical and horizontal alignment in some streets.
- 3.12. The draft level of service also covers the situation where roads and streets that are already surfaced with asphaltic concrete and don't comply with this draft level of service require resurfacing. The proposal is to resurface these with an asphaltic concrete (hotmix) or similar surface unless there are compelling technical and cost reasons for not doing so.
- 3.13. Under the proposed level of service the following strategic and arterial roads will be surfaced with asphaltic concrete or similar surfacing.

Williams Street – through entire length within the 50km/hr zone. Smith Street between Williams Street and Ranfurly Street Southbrook Road between Flaxton Road and South Belt Percival Street between South Belt and Victoria Street Northbrook Road between Victoria Street and Ivory Street Ivory Street between Northbrook Road and High Street Ashley Street between High Street and Coldstream Road High Street between Westbelt and Watkins Place King Street between High Street and Blackett Street Blackett Street between King Street and Ashley Street

- 3.14. It is noted that Lineside Road and Flaxton Road in Rangiora are not on the above list and this is because they are in a commercial/industrial area. The most appropriate treatment for these roads will be decided on technical and cost grounds at the time of resurfacing.
- 3.15. It is further noted that Woodend is serviced in terms of strategic roads by the State Highway which are not under the Councils control, and that the strategic road in Oxford has significantly lower volumes of traffic (approx 2,500vpd) than would warrant this additional level of service.

4. LINKS TO COMMUNITY OUTCOMES

- 4.1. There is a safe environment for all
 - · Road accidents are minimised
- 4.2. Transport is accessible, convenient, reliable, affordable and sustainable
 - Christchurch is readily accessible by cycle, car, truck, bus or train.

5. CONSULTATION

5.1. Maori

Maori have not been directly consulted on this matter, and it is not considered necessary to do so.

5.2. External

There has been no consultation with the public specifically on this proposed policy.

There was extensive consultation on the roading levels of service as part of the development of the Roading Activity Management Plan in 2005.

Recent feedback from residents of Ivory Street and Ashley Street indicates road noise and vibration affects the quality of life for people living on these streets.

Feedback generally supports the view that residents would prefer hotmix to chipseal on busy roads.

Due to the fact that the level of Service is being improved, it is not considered necessary to consult the wider public.

5.3. Internal

The Roading Manager, Manager Utilities and roading and the roading team have been involved in the development of this policy.

The Management Team was consulted during the preparation of this report.

6. OPTIONS

The Committee can adopt, decline to adopt or amend the proposed draft level of service.

It is recommended that further streets not be added to the list without first investigating and providing justification for their inclusion, as this will have cost implications. It is also noted that this work is subsidised by Land Transport NZ so work that cannot be justified on technical, cost and environmental grounds runs the risk of not being approved by Land Transport NZ.

7. STATUTE

This matter is not covered by any statute.

8. FINANCIAL

The 2007/08 budgets for resurfacing are \$1,144,233 for chipsealing and \$124,185 for hotmix. The annual depreciation for road surfacing is \$1,232,155.

If it is assumed the existing level of service is allowed for in current budgets and roads that are currently surfaced with asphaltic concrete will continue to be surfaced with asphaltic concrete then the additional cost of the policy is an increase in annual depreciation of about \$48,000 when fully implemented. It is likely to take 6 to 8 years before all roads in the listy are resurfaced so this would be an increase in depreciation of around \$7,000 per year.

9. RISK

A risk in approving this draft level of service is that residents on roads on the list will want the resurfacing done as soon as possible and will pressure the Council to do so. This will be mitigated to a certain degree by the fact that the worst sections, i.e. part of Ashley Street and part of Ivory Street, will be resurfaced over the next two years. Also part of Williams Street is being resurfaced with asphaltic concrete this year, and a high proportion of High Street is already surfaced with hotmix or similar surfacing.

A risk in not approving the draft level of service is that there will be inconsistent treatments leading to community dissatisfaction. It is also possible a decision could be made on the surfacing type based on the traffic volumes when it is resurfaced and the volumes may change shortly after. It would then be at least 10 years before it is due for resurfacing next.

A risk in adding streets to the list without due consideration and justification is that the budget will have to be increased, and Land Transport NZ may not approve the programme resulting in loss of subsidy.

10. POLICY/DELEGATION REFERENCE

Due to the fact that the Roading Activity Management Plan was originally adopted by the full Council, it is appropriate that any amendments be referred to it. This matter has been referred to the Committee for a recommendation.

Draft Level of Service to be included in the Roading Activity Management Plan

The use of Asphaltic Concrete (Hotmix) or similar surfacing on Roads

- 1. The surfacing treatment for sealed roads should be chosen on technical grounds and to ensure the lowest lifecycle cost is achieved, and at the same time taking into account environmental factors such as the noise and vibration effect on residential property.
- 2. Generally the most appropriate and cost effective surfacing on the majority of the sealed roads in the District will be chip seal. Asphaltic concrete (hotmix) or similar surfacing is appropriate on strategic and arterial roads through residential areas in order to minimise noise and vibration, and in areas where high turning movements, such as at intersections and in commercial areas, to minimise damage to the road surface.
- 3. The purpose of this policy is to ensure there is a consistent and transparent approach to the use of Asphaltic concrete (hotmix) or similar surfacing on roads.
- 4. Asphaltic concrete (hotmix) or similar surfacing will be used on all strategic and arterial roads from the residential boundaries in Kaiapoi and Rangiora, as follows: -

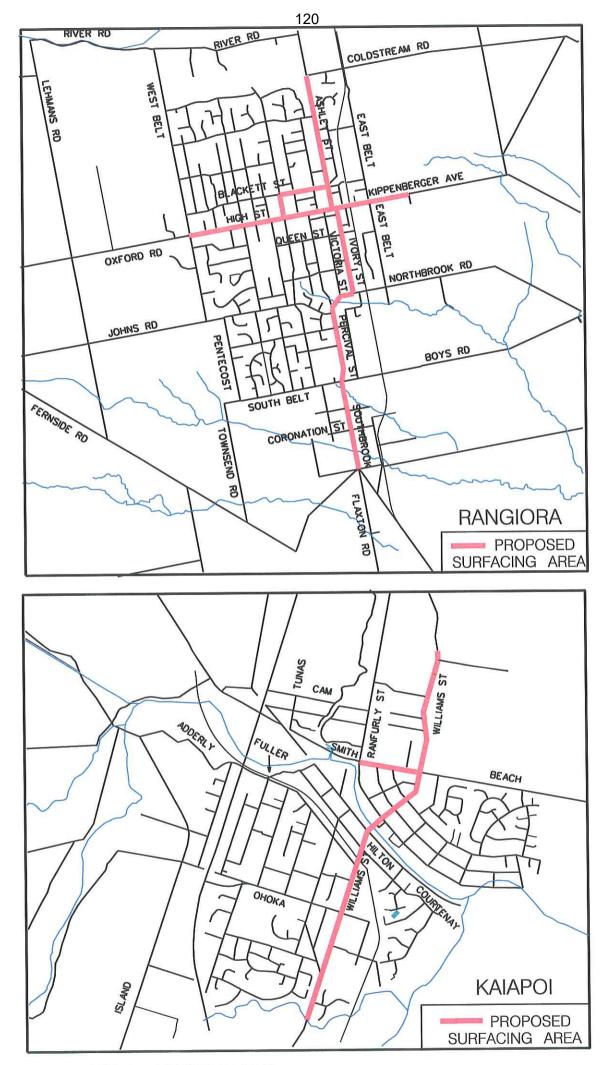
Kaiapoi

Williams Street – through the entire length within the 50km/hr zone. Smith Street between Williams Street and Ranfurly Street

Rangiora

Southbrook Road between Flaxton Road and South Belt Percival Street between South Belt and Victoria Street Northbrook Road between Victoria Street and Ivory Street Ivory Street between Northbrook Road and High Street Ashley Street between High Street and Coldstream Road High Street between West Belt and Watkins Place King Street between High Street and Blackett Street Blackett Street between King Street and Ashley Street

- 5. If the above roads are currently chipsealed then they will be resurfaced with asphaltic concrete (hotmix) or similar surfacing when next due for resurfacing, except in the case where more resurfacing is due in any one year than the budget allows. In these cases the roads with the highest volume will be resurfaced with asphaltic concrete (hotmix) or similar surfacing first and the other roads will be sealed with a small sized chip seal to extend the life for up to three years and then they will be resurfaced with asphaltic concrete (hotmix) or similar surfacing.
- Asphaltic concrete (hotmix) or similar surfacing, such as slurry seal, will be used on all cul-de-sac turning heads.
- 7. Asphaltic concrete (hotmix) or similar surfacing will be used on other roads where high turning movements justify its use.
- 8. Asphaltic concrete (hotmix) or similar surfacing will be used where it is the most appropriate and cost effective method for removing depressions and inconsistencies in vertical and horizontal alignment.
- 9. In situations where roads and streets which are already surfaced with asphaltic concrete (hotmix) or similar material, but are not consistent with this policy, require resurfacing they will re resurfaced with an asphaltic concrete (hotmix) or similar surface unless there are compelling technical and cost reasons for not doing so.
