107 Revells Road - Vision and Objectives

Vision:

A dynamic, self-sustainable ecosystem that fosters biodiversity, cultural connections, and community engagement, evolving into an accessible sanctuary that inspires and educates future generations.

1. Promote Biodiversity Restoration:

- Maintain, enhance, and restore native flora and fauna, focusing on creating richly biodiverse land.
- Develop an ecological network that supports diverse species and natural processes.

2. Foster Community Engagement and Education:

- Involve local communities, including school children, in the development and maintenance of the ecosystem.
- Create educational programs and materials to raise awareness about biodiversity, cultural heritage, and environmental stewardship.

3. Enhance Water Quality:

- Implement measures to improve and maintain water quality within and downstream of the ecosystem.
- Monitor water quality regularly to ensure a healthy environment for both wildlife and human visitors.

4. Enhance Accessibility and Connectivity:

- Design the space to be inclusive and accessible to everyone, ensuring that all individuals, regardless of physical ability, can access and enjoy the area.
- Develop infrastructure that accommodates future climate change and supports physical and cultural connections.
- Encourage people to physically connect to the natural environment.

5. Create a Dynamic and Adaptable Space:

- Design the ecosystem to be adaptable, allowing for changes over time while maintaining its core values.
- Encourage community interaction and the ability to modify the space to meet evolving needs.
- Develop and enhance nature-based solutions to effectively address both environmental and community challenges.

6. Preserve Cultural and Historical Values:

- Integrate cultural values and historical elements, such as the flax harvest, into the ecosystem.
- Promote the space as a sanctuary that honours the past while looking to the future.

7. Support Sustainable Practices and Self-Sufficiency:

- Develop an ecosystem that maintains its own balance and health through natural processes.
- Encourage practices like Mahinga Kai, where the community can harvest resources sustainably.

8. Promote Enjoyment and Wellbeing:

- Create meditative spaces for relaxation and connection with nature.
- Ensure the space provides enjoyment through passive recreation and active engagement.

9. Inspire Future Generations:

- Use the ecosystem as a model for sustainable development.
- Inspire future generations to value and protect natural environments through hands-on experiences and learning opportunities.

10. Maintain Land Integrity:

- Preserve the designated area to maintain its ecological and cultural significance.
- Encourage and support adjacent landowners and the wider community to acknowledge, maintain and enhance the natural environment.

These objectives aim to create a thriving, sustainable ecosystem that benefits both the environment and the community, aligning with the vision of fostering biodiversity, cultural connections, and community engagement.
