4. DEPUTATIONS AND PRESENTATIONS

4.1. Core boards – Anette de Joux

A de Joux introduced herself as a teacher at Rangiora High School, specialising in learning support as part of the Lighthouse Programme. The programme served 40 students with a variety of intellectual disabilities, which often included communication barriers. The programme strived to provide students with autonomy and access to communication. To achieve this, they utilised Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC), including core boards. These boards offered essential words and phrases that were frequently used in communication, enabling individuals to express themselves effectively, make informed choices, and engage in meaningful conversations.

A de Joux felt it was essential for a core board to be installed in Victoria Park, Rangiora, as play was essential for the development of young people, and they could have the most significant impact when children were younger and around their peers. Core boards also aided in normalising non-verbal communication from a young age. Generally, handheld core boards were used; however, in playground settings, they limited play. A large core board in a playground would be accessible to all users and would be tailored to the equipment present.

I Campbell questioned what other tools were used to aid in Augmentative and Alternative Communication. A de Joux noted that the TalkLink Trust funded most resources of alternative communication once children started school. However, children also modelled through visual communication, literacy programmes and sign language.

M Fleming queried where else in the Waimakariri District A de Joux would wish to see core boards installed. A de Joux would like to encourage the installation of core boards in all public places, as they are not only used by children.

In response to a further question from M Fleming, A de Joux advised that she believed the core board should be located as close to the Victoria Park playground as possible to encourage usage, as play is essential for the development of young people.

A de Joux was thanked for her deputation and invited to stay to listen to consideration of the report of 6.3 on the agenda in relation to her deputation.

5. ADJOURNED BUSINESS

6. REPORTS

Item 6.7 was considered next; however, to keep clarity, the Minutes followed the agenda's order.

- 6.1. School Variable Speed Limits Proposal P Daly (Road Safety Coordinator/Journey Planner) J McBride (Roading and Transportation Manager)
 - J McBride took the report as read, highlighting that staff had made minor amendments following the workshop held with the Board in August 2025. She confirmed that all schools, including high schools, required variable speed zones. Feedback had been received from all Community Boards regarding consistency throughout the Waimakariri District, and all variable speed zones at schools had been updated to be either 60km/h or 30km/h.
 - B. McLaren inquired about the signage that would be present to motorists travelling south on Kinley Street, Rangiora. P. Daly noted that it would be challenging to install signage on Kinley Street unless there were several signs, as not all vehicles would pass by a single sign. However, anyone entering the variable speed zone would pass a sign, and residents

within the zone would become aware of the change in speed limit for school pick-up and drop-off times.

K Barnett queried why static signs were not proposed outside for Rangiora High School, as East Belt was primarily used for school-related traffic, and speed humps were already in place. J McBride explained that while static signage had been considered, staff recommended electronic signs for several reasons. The high school operated on both sides of the road and intended to use the ten-minute variable speed limit during school hours. Although high school students were expected to understand safe road-crossing behaviour, observed patterns showed many crossing without looking. Additionally, the school had expressed concerns about vehicle speeds and traffic volumes. Based on these factors, staff concluded that electronic signage would provide the most effective solution.

K Barnett noted that variable speed limits were initially designed for younger primary school-aged children. He questioned whether their use in this context might discourage older students from practising safe road-crossing behaviour. J McBride clarified that the setting of the speed limit rule did not differentiate based on the age of the students.

J Goldsworthy questioned the cost to the Council for non-compliance if the Board did not want electronic signage at Rangiora High School. J McBride replied that using static signage would be compliant under the rule; however, where there was pedestrian activity on both sides of the road, electronic signs were preferable. P Daly commented that the Rangiora High School's primary concern was the side-to-side crossing between periods. Electronic signage was the only way to mitigate those concerns.

In response to a question from K Barnett, J McBride observed that staff had assessed traffic volumes, and North Loburn School was identified as being located on a low-volume road that was not used as a through route. The community using the road should be aware that a school was present.

K Barnett raised the concern that North Loburn School was located on a 100km/h road with regular logging traffic and other heavy vehicles. The school had previously installed its own electronic sign; however, it was faulty. She believed that the lower traffic density resulted in an increased speed, and it would, therefore, be a disservice to Loburn North school students not to have electronic signs.

K Barnett further noted that while it would be incredible if the Council could afford to install electronic signs outside every school in the district, it was not viable, as the Government was not providing funding, and the cost would fall on ratepayers. East Belt was a slow-speed environment which people avoided due to the speed humps and the high school. She felt that installing electronic speed signs at a high school might inadvertently teach students not to obey road rules or to cross the road safely. If the school wanted electronic signs, they could pay for them, as static signs would comply with the speed limit setting rule.

R Brine agreed motorists would slow down for speed humps; however, once past, they would increase in speed again. He was happy to support the amendment as the cost would not be affected.

In his right of reply, J Gerard stated he would not support either amendment. It was important to have uniformity across the district. Whilst it was easy to debate that children needed road safety education, the signs were not for the pedestrians; they were for the drivers, who should also be educated.

G MacLeod took the report as read and welcomed any questions.

M Fleming asked if installing the print on the exterior wall of 140 High Street, Rangiora, would affect the possibility of showing films at the Good Street courtyard. G MacLeod replied that it was proposed for the exact location; however, as of yet, there had been no uptake on showing a film. Staff would identify another wall in the event someone wanted to show a movie.

- (g) Notes that the prints may have a display life exceeding ten years, when considering that the existing eight prints (on the east exterior wall of the BNZ building at Cenotaph Corner) have been on public display for over ten years and are still going strong.
- (h) **Notes** that the installation costs for the prints (up to \$1,000, depending) will be covered from one of the Greenspace Unit's general operation budgets.

CARRIED

B McLaren was delighted to see the two historic panels come to life again. He was also pleased that the other historic panels currently displayed on the east wall of the BNZ building at Cenotaph Corner would be incorporated in the new development.

K Barnett also supported the motion, noting that it was essential for the historic panels to be enjoyed by the public again.

6.3. <u>Core Board Installation in Victoria Park</u> – Chrissy Taylor-Claude (Parks Officer) Jill Borland (Greenspace Strategy and Partnership Team Leader) and Martin Pugh (Community Development Facilitator)

G MacLeod noted that the preferred location for the core board would be within the Victoria Park playground area. He highlighted that a key objective in designing play spaces was to foster inclusion by bringing together individuals of varying abilities. Installing a core board in this area would directly support that goal by allowing people who needed to use it and those who were interested in it to foster connections. The Council had endorsed the installation of core boards in green spaces, libraries, and aquatic facilities, with the potential to expand to service centres as well.

M. Pugh added that core boards had undergone a robust evaluation programme with the Waimakariri Access Group.

M Fleming asked if staff would be working with the Lighthouse Programme regarding the symbols used on the boards. M Pugh confirmed that staff would take advice from many sources, including the Lighthouse Programme and other regular users of core boards. The symbols would primarily be based on the location and facilities in place where the core boards were to be installed.

J Goldsworthy questioned whether te Reo Māori would be included on the core board alongside English. M Pugh highlighted that the majority of core boards in New Zealand included bilingual signage, and the staff intended to include both English and te Reo Māori. They would be working with Whitiora and local hapu to ensure accuracy.

K Barnett sought clarity on where in Victoria Park the core board would be placed and what direction it would face. G MacLeod observed that staff would take advice from the Board on the proposed location of the board. However, staff envisioned it would be

encompassed within the playground. Victoria Park was identified as a suitable location for a core board, as it already had sensory features that complemented it. He also noted that the core board would be double-sided.

B McLaren noted that approximately 25% of the population was neurodiverse, and core boards would aid in Augmentative and Alternative Communication for those people. He was pleased that the core board would be located within the playground area, thereby being sympathetic to the amenity of Victoria Park for the rest of the community.

M Fleming supported the motion, highlighting that she was thankful to see more accessibility for all.

K Barnett was also supportive of the motion; however, the Board had to respect all users of Victoria Park and maintain the natural ambience.

6.4. <u>Canterbury Street Reserve Play Space Concept Plan for Consultation</u> – T Stableford (Landscape Architect)

T Stableford took the report as read, noting that the Canterbury Street Reserve was the only reserve and play space in the Ashley Village. A consultation was conducted with children living in the village and their households, with a central point of feedback being the need for more play equipment for all age groups.

M Fleming asked if the multi-use hard space would be flush to the ground to enable access for people with disabilities. T Stableford confirmed the hard space would be flush. Staff were hoping that skating facilities could be provided in the future if additional budget became available.

In response to a further question from M Fleming, T Stableford confirmed that the hamster wheel could be located nearer the picnic table, allowing for more hard space; however, there was currently no sufficient budget available.

K Barnett questioned the Council's policy regarding litter bins in reserves. G MacLeod stated bins were part of the amenity in locations such as the Canterbury Street Reserve. However, the Board could choose not to include them. Staff were in the process of developing an active Sport and Recreation Strategy to develop more guidance on play spaces.

L. McClure inquired whether a core board could also be installed in the Canterbury Street Reserve. G MacLeod advised that accessibility in playgrounds was held under a separate budget; however, a core board could be retrofitted in the future.

In response to a query from B McLaren, T Stableford highlighted that the Waimakariri Access Group would be consulted as part of the consultation process.

T Kunkel reported that the Ashgrove Netball Club had applied for funding to purchase new uniforms and bibs for their junior teams, which consisted of approximately 60 players. The application complied with the Board's Discretionary Grant Application Criteria, as it was from a sports club, and it was estimated that all the approximately beneficiaries would be from the Rangiora-Ashley Ward.
